6a. Financial Report/Approval of Bills

As of the first of April, Library Fund balances stand at (271) \$305,555.87, (471) \$106,201.33, and (472) \$352,614.05, for a total of \$764,371.25. Bank balance is \$764,121.25, which is exactly \$250 less than fund balance, and obviously due to the "Cash Imprest" line on the 271 balance sheet.

Revenues look horrible—we still have no credit for any collected taxes, (and no deferred tax asset on the balance sheet), so we show a negative \$184,000+ there. Also, we are still running behind on penal fines, about \$7,300 behind target for the year. Average per month is only about \$7100, which has improved, but less than the \$9500 per month we estimated in the budget. Next month receipts are larger,

\$10,893.

Expenditures are well below target YTD, with these line items to watch: Utilities(920) Professional Services(864), Public Relations(880), all are outpacing budget, but not yet overspent. Legal expense (831) may be one to watch, as we go forward with our project, and the idea of a "contract" with the County. Activity in the New Construction Fund, 472, saw revenues of \$911.61, of which \$889.41 was interest on our CDs, and \$22.20 donations. Expenditures were

There is a maturing CD at FAFCU worth about \$25,400 in our 472 fund. Treasurer recommends that it be cashed, and the proceeds transferred to Chemical Bank Cash account. This will effectively cover the \$100,000 budget in that fund for 2017. We continue monitoring of the amounts we submit against each line item versus what shows up when the County sends out the SBR. At the end of March, there was disagreement in 864 Professional Services & Ed, 920 Utilities, 931 Maint. B&G, and 933 Computer Maint.

Work is progressing on a program to automate the Bills/Voucher generation process.

The Kalkaska community planning process, by which four agencies (DDA, Village, County, and Library) are creating/updating five plans (DDA plan update, Village Master Plan update, Village Recreation Plan update, County Recreation plan update, and Library Master Plan) is entering a new stage and needs your input!

The organizational team, with representation from the agencies mentioned above, has facilitated several public input opportunities early in the planning process – Speak Up Kalkaska! held on February 1st and a survey distributed on February 2nd and closing March 24th. The results are enclosed for your reference and the analysis of these results will be presented at the April 25th meeting.

The next steps are to analyze the goals and priorities of each agency. This analysis will be performed in focus groups (held in May or early June) by applying guiding principles to evaluate identified goals/priorities. Each agency will use the same guiding principles. These have been drafted by the organizational team and are enclosed for your review.

Not only will the focus groups help to determine which Library Master Plan goals/priorities are most critical, feasible, and sustainable – these will also offer an additional input opportunity for the public to attend. After the focus groups conclude (each agency is hosting at least one focus group in May/June), Networks Northwest will draft the plans from June – August and the organizational team will reconvene in September for an initial review of the draft plan.

In summary, the April 25th meeting discussion points will include:

- a) Presentation regarding public input results
- b) Discuss guiding principles & next steps
- c) Designate representation to the Library Master Plan focus group

Public Input Report & Analysis

Background

In 2017, the Village of Kalkaska, Kalkaska Downtown Development Authority (DDA), Kalkaska County, and Kalkaska County Library teamed up to plan collaboratively for the future vision of the Kalkaska community and the role each entity will play in making that vision a reality.

This process will result in the creation of a new Library Master Plan and updates to the existing Village Master Plan, Village Recreation Plan, DDA Plan, and County Recreation Plan.

Public Input

These agencies offered several public input opportunities early in the planning process. On February 1, 2017, Speak Up Kalkaska!, a community input event, was hosted at the Kalkaska High School Auditorium. Nearly two hundred (200) residents, business owners, and other stakeholders attended the event and provided their feedback via four poster stations (one each for the Library Master Plan, Village Master Plan, DDA plan, and Village/County Recreation plans). Each poster contained a mix of multiple choice and open-ended questions. The multiple-choice questions were limited to the "top three" choices, to encourage participants to prioritize their values and discourage "all of the above" feedback.

Immediately following the event, on February 2, 2017, an electronic survey consisting of the same questions, was released via Survey Monkey by the agency staff and volunteers spearheading this process. Those individuals distributed the survey by email to their networks and hard copies were available at the Library building. The survey was available until March 24, 2017 and during that time two hundred and sixty-four (264) responses were received.¹

The Library, Village, County, and DDA will use these input opportunities and resulting feedback to:

- Determine where and how to focus future activities
- Determine plan goals related to community priorities
- Encourage public participation in the community planning process

The following report summarizes the Village Master Plan community feedback with some background information on each question in order to aid in analysis. Complete event and online survey results are included as attachments to this document.

¹ It is possible that individuals who attended Speak Up Kalkaska! provided additional and/or repeat feedback via the distributed survey.

Introductory Note: Using the Survey Results

When reviewing survey results, it's important to note that the questionnaire is not a statistically valid survey. Results must be balanced with additional data sources and dialogues, including committee discussion, focus groups, other forms of public input, and research and analysis. Further, survey responses are only one factor to consider when engaging in discussion and making decisions about plan content and goals, and as such should be evaluated in the perspective of the planning process as a whole: as a single dataset created at the beginning of the process, survey results will help to point the way towards additional research, input opportunities, and discussion throughout the process.

Demographics

Demographic data is only available for the distributed survey responses. The Speak Up Kalkaska! event did not require attendants to provide demographic data before participating.

Of the two hundred and sixty-four (264) survey responses, fifty-three (53) respondents reside within the Village of Kalkaska, one hundred and sixty-seven (167) respondents reside within Kalkaska County (excluding the Village), and forty-four (44) respondents do not reside within the Village nor County.

Sixteen (16) respondents own a business within the Village and twenty-six (26) respondents own a business within the County (excluding the Village).

The results shown below will analyze the responses of all survey participants and Speak Up Kalkaska! attendants.

Kalkaska County Library Questions & Analysis

In 2016, the Library Board and staff identified the need for an updated five year plan to guide the library's programming, collections, budget, and potential replacement of the existing facility. A strategic planning committee, composed of Board, staff, and volunteer membership, was formed to facilitate the development of the plan. While participating in the Kalkaska Community Planning process with the Village, DDA, and County, the Library is also engaging with several external consultants to conduct a feasibility study, identify design options, and determine community support regarding the construction of a new library facility.

The library questions in the survey and at the Speak Up Kalkaska! event asked participants to consider what brings them to the library, how the library currently enhances the community, and what they would like to see in a new library.

Question 1 - What draws you to the library? (Pick no more than 3)

Survey Results

Two hundred and forty-two (242) participants responded to this question via the distributed survey. Those results are below:

- 1. Books (70%)
- 2. Free Internet/Computers (26%)

- 3. MELCAT borrow books from other libraries (25%)
- 4. Children's Programs (24%)
- 5. Adult Programs (19%)
- 6. DVD/CD Rental (19%)

The majority of respondents, seventy percent (70%), selected books, twenty-six percent (26%) selected free internet/computers, and twenty-five percent (25%) selected the MELCAT borrowing system, as one of their top three reasons to visit the library.

Forty-three "other" comments were submitted, eleven (11) of which stated the participant does not use the library, four (4) comments pointing to the library staff as a reason for visiting, and four (4) comments regarding the meeting/work space available for use.

Event Results

Speak Up Kalkaska! attendants' responses vary slightly from the survey responses, with children's programs identified as a top three priority, rather than the MELCAT program. Of the one hundred and sixty-nine (169) votes provided for this question, twenty-five percent (25%) were for books, twenty-two percent (22%) for children's programs, and twenty-one percent (21%) for free internet/computers. The "other" comments provided were consistent with those submitted in the survey.

Question 2 – How can the library enhance the community? (Pick no more than 3)

Survey Results

Two hundred and forty-two (242) participants responded to this question via the distributed survey. The results are below:

- 1. New library with community space (66%)
- 2. Movies in the park (42%)
- 3. Technology Training (41%)
- 4. Health and Fitness Training (22%)
- 5. Inter-Village Trail Connector (21%)
- 6. Architectural match with existing downtown buildings (21%)

Two-thirds of respondents selected new library with community space, forty-two percent (42%) selected movies in the park, and forty-one percent (41%) selected technology training as a top three opportunity for the library to enhance the Kalkaska community.

Twenty-seven (27) "other" comments were submitted, seven (7) of which expressed a desire for expanded programming and class opportunities for all ages, in the areas of arts, technology, and finance. Five (5) comments expressed the need for extended hours or collections offered by the library.

Event Results

Speak Up Kalkaska! attendants' responses are consistent with the survey results.

Question 3 - What would you like to see in a new library? (Pick no more than 3)

Survey Results

Two hundred and forty-two (242) participants responded to this question via the distributed survey. The results are below:

- 1. Community Space (68%)
- 2. Hosting Events (41%)
- 3. Conference Room (40%)
- 4. Quiet Study Space (38%)
- 5. Social Gatherings (28%)
- 6. Kitchen Space (12%)
- 7. Maker Space (8%)

Similarly to question 2, two-thirds of respondents selected new library with community space as a top three priority for the new library. Forty-one percent (41%) selected hosting events, and forty percent (40%) selected conference room as among their top three priorities for a new library.

Nineteen (19) "other" comments were submitted, five (5) of which expressed the desire for a comfortable and inviting space, "...need a place to just sit and sip their coffee and read with good lighting". Two (2) comments expressed a desire for additional classes and programming, similar to the comments in question two. Two (2) comments spoke to the new library's location in relation to its surroundings, referencing the need for safe pedestrian amenities and connectivity to downtown.


Event Results

Speak Up Kalkaska! attendants' responses vary from the survey results, with a quiet study space identified as a top three priority for a new library, rather than hosting events. The comments submitted at the event are consistent with those received in the survey.


Q2 Do you live in Kalkaska (principal residency)?


Q3 Do you own a business in Kalkaska?

Q4 What draws you to the library? (pick no more than 3)

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

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

Kalkaska Planning Guiding Principles

The following guiding principles will be used to evaluate the goals and objectives which have emerged from the Kalkaska planning process thus far. This method provides an objective and consistent evaluation method for each agency to evaluate their unique goals.

The guiding principles are listed below:

- 1. First step is the goal/objective meaningful, purposeful, relevant to the agency evaluating it? Due to the number of agencies participating in this process, County Park-specific objectives, for example, are best evaluated by the County Parks & Recreation agency.
- 2. Second step evaluate the goal/objective via the guiding principles listed below:

Funding - The goal/objective is likely to receive funding (grant, private donation, crowdfunding, millage, etc)

Public Supports – The goal/objective is important to the public, based on the results of Speak Up Kalkaska!, follow-up survey, and previous planning processes.

Public Safety – The goal/objective supports, enhances, and protects public safety.

Economic Driver – The goal/objective supports new and existing jobs and business.

Sustainability – The goal/objective can be achieved utilizing existing capacity and resources, which can be reasonably maintained over its lifetime.

Compatibility – The goal/objective supports the other agencies' goals/objectives.

The guiding principles will be weighted evenly, i.e. each principle is worth two points. Below is an example of how these may be applied towards a specific goal:
